Tony works as a researcher and consultant on international development with a particular focus on poverty reduction, monitoring and evaluation. Over the last 10 years she has advised 15 United Nations agencies on monitoring and evaluation. Tony lives in Vancouver.</p><p>Terry Boehm, President, National Farmers Union, Allan, Saskatchewan. Terry is a Saskatchewan canola farmer who serves as Vice President of the National Farmers Union (NFU). Terry participates in government consultations on behalf of the NFU and was part of the legal advising team to Percy Schmeiser's case against Monsanto.</p><p>Abra Brynne has worked since the mid 1990s on providing education and resources to both ends of the food production chain - farmers and consumers. She has extensive experience in environmental and social standards development and conformity assessment, on a regional, provincial, national and international level. Devlin is a researcher based in Montreal, Quebec and works with the international organization GRAIN. In the late 1990s, Devlin lived and worked with non-governmental and peasant organizations in Malaysia and the Philippines. Devlin is active in Canada through his research and involvement in various organizations and networks, such as The Forum on Privatization and the Public Domain. He is the author of *The Real Board of Directors: The construction of biotechnology policy in Canada, 1980-2002* and *Good Crop, Bad Crop: Seed Politics and the Future of Food in Canada*, published by Between the Lines Press November 2007.</p><p>Colleen Ross, Executive Board, National Farmers Union, Iroquois, Ontario - Colleen is an Ontario organic grain and oil seed farmer. Colleen also works as the Ontario Project Manager for Heifer International and serves as Women's President of the National Farmers Union. Colleen travels extensively through the country speaking with urban consumers and farming communities about the farm crisis and genetically engineered crops. Colleen also travels internationally to meet with farmers' organizations in the South and attended the grass roots farmer Food Sovereignty Summit in Mali in 2007.</p><p>Tom Rudge, GE Free Yukon. Tom raises heritage pigs, cows, cashmere goats, organic chickens, cereal and hay crops and garden vegetables on 160 acres in the Yukon. With a BSc in Agriculture Tom is a founding member of the local Fireweed Community Market and the secretary of the local organic chapter of the Canadian Organic Growers. He is also a volunteer with Food Secure Canada and local Slow Food convivium leader. Maureen and her partner previously farmed in Northwest B.C., growing certified organic vegetables and hay. Maureen also works part time as an organic inspector and is a member of the Independent Organic Inspectors Association. She is a member of the Board of Directors of the Ecological Farmers Association of Ontario (EFAO), as one of three people representing the Eastern Ontario region.</p><p>Moe Garahan has been working on food security issues in Ottawa since 1995. She was part of the founding teams for the Good Food Box, the Community Garden Network and the Ottawa Food Security Council. Moe acted as Coordinator of the Ontario Food Security Council (now Just Food) between 2004-2005 and is now the program director. Moe is passionate about connecting people to their food sources.</p><p>Cathy Holtslander is a Board member and Secretary of the Saskatchewan Organic Directorate and a member of their Organic Agriculture Protection Fund Committee, which is the committee overseeing the lawsuits filed by organic canola farmers against Monsanto and Bayer seeking damages for GE contamination of crops. Cathy was Coordinator of the Saskatchewan Eco Network for 6 years and is a founding member of the Worker's cooperative that staffs the national Beyond Factory Farming Coalition.</p><p>Catherine Kleinsteuber is a full time, organic farmer on a small-scale mixed farm in Powell River B.C. She also is a coordinator for the Coalition for Safe Food whichs

uccessfully worked to have the Powell River Regional District declare a Genetically Engineered Free Crop Area. Catherine also works locally on other important food sovereignty and sustainability issues.

Brewster Kneen, Publisher, *The Ram's Horn*, Ottawa. Brewster is publisher of [The Ram's Horn](http://www.ramshorn.ca/) newsletter and is the internationally renowned author of several books on food and agriculture, including *Farmageddon*, *Food and the Culture of Biotechnology* and *Invisible Giant: Cargill and Its Transnational Strategies*. Brewster is founder of [The Forum on Privatization and the Patenting of Life](http://www.forumonpublicdomain.ca/) and has worked on issues relating to biotechnology for more than 15 years. Brewster farmed with his family in Nova Scotia for 15 years and organized the Northumberland Lamb Marketing Co-op. He has traveled internationally to work with other networks and is a past member of the international board of directors of GRAIN.

Aimee Watson, North Kootenay Lake Food Security Coordinator and Lawns to Gardens Program Coordinator, Kootenay BC. Aimee has been working with food security initiatives since 2003, originating in the soil of one of BC's first farming cooperatives, the Fraser Common Farm. She farmed for several years and moved to the Kootenay to pursue a self-sufficient lifestyle. Once there, she co-founded the [Kaslo Food Security project](http://www.nklcss.org/) now in its third year, farming on a village scale with four plots growing veggies to quinoa for home use, research and connections. Currently, she sits on the boards of The Community Garden Society of Kaslo, Kootenay Local Agriculture Society, and works with the GEF Free Kootenay's campaign.
